A

s the co-winner of the 2015 Scripps National Spelling Bee, Gokul Venkatachalam has appeared on national television, received autographed tennis shoes from LeBron James, his basketball hero, and been the guest of ABC television personality Jimmy Kimmel. But the 14-year-old freshman at West High says high school is as big an adjustment for him as anyone else.

High School Takes Time

“High school is a lot more time consuming than middle school,” he says. The four hours a day he once devoted to spelling as a West Middle school student are now filled with Latin; Algebra II, his

favorite subject; and the high school debate team; among other things. “Spelling helped prepared me for debate because I learned a lot of vocabulary and acquired public speaking and interview skills.”

This winter, he also plans to try out for the basketball team as a point or shooting guard.

Will he wear the sneakers from LeBron James? “No,” he says, “they are not my size. I don’t wear them. I keep them in a glass box.” Gokul was jubilant when LeBron James’ basketball team, the Cleveland Cavaliers, unexpectedly contacted him last spring and told him the tennis shoes would

arrive. “When the package came in the mail, I invited a friend to open it with me. I was so excited.” James sent two pairs of sneakers, one with a special autographed message: “Congrats on being spelling ‘B’ champ.”

Mom Is Early Coach

Gokul occasionally stays in touch with his Scripps National Spelling Bee Co-Champion, Vanya Shivashankar. But apart from spelling, they have different interests. “She is into music and acting. And I am into business and politics.” After high school and college, Gokul sees his future as an investment banker or business entrepreneur. “I like how entrepreneurship incorporates many skills, including math, public speaking, history, etc.”

What advice does Gokul have for other spellers?

“They need a good sense of phonics before they get into it. Good spellers are good readers. They see the words.”

“My mom was my early spelling coach. She taught me spelling through phonics. In Parkway in first and second grade at Claymont Elemen-

tary, my teachers saw I had a knack for spelling, and they gave me extra words to spell. Parkway really helped prepare me for spelling.”

Gokul has his eye on a few up and coming spellers, but doesn’t want to name any names. “That is a loaded question,” he jokes. For him, spelling is more about the challenge of putting words together, like puzzle pieces, rather than memorization. His favorite word is still “sangfroid,” which means coolness under pressure. That word described his performance during the Scripps National Spelling Bee competition last May. The *St. Louis Post-Dispatch* dubbed him “Cool Hand Gokul.”

Still Cool Under Pressure

These days, Cool Hand Gokul hopes to build the same sense of community with debate that he experienced with spelling. “That was my favorite part of the bee,” he says, “the sense of community.”

“I wasn’t looking for 15 minutes of fame,” he adds, “but I didn’t shy away once it came. It was a great opportunity. My hard work got me there.”

Parkway High Schools Named Among America's Best



West High has been named one of 'America's Best High Schools' by *Newsweek* with West coming in at a rank of 363. Only nine Missouri high schools were selected.

The *Newsweek* High School Rankings—recognizing the achievements of the best public high schools in the United States for college readiness—have been published for more than a decade. Since 2014, *Newsweek* has published two separate lists in an effort to address the complexities of assessing the "best" high schools when students' socioeconomic backgrounds are taken into account.

Earlier this year, all four Parkway high schools – Central, North, South and West – were honored as the country's Best High Schools by *U.S. News & World Report*. In addition, the four high schools were also named America's Most Challenging High Schools by *The Washington Post* in May.

Two More for Parkway

National Blue Ribbon Schools

Parkway now has 17 National Blue Ribbon Schools.

Two Parkway schools - McKelvey Elementary and West Middle - have been named 2015 National Blue Ribbon Schools. Only eight public schools in Missouri earned the recognition. Parkway now has 17 Blue Ribbon Schools.

"I am extremely proud of the high academic achievement at McKelvey Elementary and West Middle schools," said Superintendent Dr. Keith Marty. "Achieving National Blue Ribbon status was a team effort from teachers, students and parents. Both schools are meeting the needs of all students and demonstrate that all can achieve at high levels."

The U.S. Department of Education will honor 285 public and 50 private schools at a recognition ceremony this November in Washington, D.C.

Earlier this year these schools were honored as Missouri Gold Star Schools, a program conducted by the Missouri Department of

Elementary and Secondary Education.

More than 7,500 schools across the country have been honored as Blue Ribbon Schools since the program was founded in 1982. The state and national programs are part of a larger effort to identify and disseminate knowledge about best school-leadership and teaching practices.

The National Blue Ribbon Schools Program honors public and private elementary, middle, and high schools where students either achieve very high learning standards or are making notable improvements in closing the achievement gap. The award plaque affirms the hard work of students, educators, families and communities in creating safe and welcoming schools where students master challenging content. The award flag gracing a school's building is a widely recognized symbol of exemplary teaching and learning.

'Thank You, Mrs. Mecham, Ma'am'

Decades after
graduating from
Central High,
Kevin Perz sends
his former
teacher a
thank-you note
and \$10,000 for
being the "best
teacher ever."

When former Central High teacher Marilyn Mecham opened the letter, she started to cry. Her long ago student, Kevin Perz, had written to thank her for the profound impact she had on his life. "You were the B-E-S-T teacher EVER," he wrote. Along with the letter, Kevin enclosed a \$10,000 check.

Kevin had searched for his former food science teacher for some time, and a few days before writing and sending the letter, he had finally found her in Nebraska, and called her. He had hoped she would remember him from her co-ed food science class at Central High in 1976 (she did).

She had been tolerant of his antics, he says, including the respectful moniker he and his friends gave her: Mrs. Mecham Ma'am. In a light-hearted classroom atmosphere that allowed students to enjoy each other as they learned, her lessons were as much about how to treat others as they were about culinary skills.

"It was an exception-

ally fun class," says Kevin, an industrial engineer and president at Dynamic Fastener, a commercial construction supplier in Kansas City, Mo.

"Some of my teachers helped me academically, while others helped me mature as an individual. She helped me get on the right course by treating me with respect and giving me some leeway."

Kevin spent years searching for Mecham without success, and finally contacted the Parkway Alumni Association for help. Jan Misuraca, executive director of the PAA, was able to find Mecham after numerous phone calls and emails to district retirees and grads who may have known her.

Mecham has spent the bulk of her career in Lincoln, working in the nonprofit sector. She is now executive president of the Mentors Foundation, an organization that provides mentors and funding for young people. Kevin's effort inspired her to challenge others to say

thanks—a pay-it-forward way of showing her gratitude for his gesture.

"I told Kevin that the phone call was enough," she says, "but it has had this incredible ripple effect by reminding me that I need to thank people who have helped me, too."

The ripple effect extends across oceans and continents. The story of Kevin and Mrs. Mecham Ma'am went virile on social media when it first appeared last spring, finding fans and publishers in Ukraine and England.

"The response to our story has been incredible," Mecham told the *HuffPost*.

"In an ABC interview, she talked about how appreciative she was to have Kevin spend all that time looking for her to tell her what she meant in his life.

"She is such a deserving person," Kevin told the media. "For me, it is less about the money than the sentiment of, "I enjoyed your involvement in my life and I am better for it. Thank you."

class acts

Parkway students earn perfect ACT and math scores, and computer, science and chess awards.

A team of three students from Parkway's Spark! entrepreneurial program won \$10,000 at the recent GlobalHack V competition. The competition challenges students to solve civic minded problems through technology. **Matt Sauer** and **Samuel Wait**, West High, and **Greg Cordover**, Central High, built a better website for traffic tickets. Beating out 43 other teams, the Parkway team's website includes an interface that allows users to find out how much their fine is, how to contest the ticket, how many days until they get a court appearance, etc. They are the only team in the history of the competition to place in two categories—winner of the high school division and third in the overall competition.

Robotics Success

River Bend Elementary was recently awarded a \$1,000 grant as part of the Dannette Ward Science Education Grant, sponsored by Monsanto. The grant will serve to initiate the school's first STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) program on robotics for students in kindergarten to fifth grade.

River Bend also received a "portable" 3-D printer, made available by Monsanto's Automation department. Teachers and students alike were awed by the 3-D printed items, including an adaptor that converts any cell phone into a portable microscope.

The school qualified to apply for the grant by hosting a Science Demo Day, held in conjunction with the school's science fair.

Another Perfect Score for Math Whiz Lenny Chen



Put away your calculator and sharpen your pencils. Now try to answer this question in less than two minutes: "Four consecutive odd numbers have a sum of 504. What is the median of the numbers?" This is the type of question **Lenny Chen** has been answering correctly, time and again, in regional and national math competitions. A ninth grader at West High, Lenny added up perfect scores for three consecutive years at West Middle, all the while not breaking a sweat as he followed competition rules: "No calculators. No talking. Your only tools are a pencil, a sheet of paper, and your noggin." Last spring, Lenny cinched his latest perfect score in a regional competition of Mathcounts, which is structured like a spelling bee but concentrates on such topics as probability and statistics, geometry, algebra and equations. For two consecutive years, he represented Missouri in the national competition of Mathcounts in Boston, MA. "No one else at West Middle – or in Missouri, as far as I know-- has ever achieved perfect scores three years in a row in the Missouri Math League Contest," says **Joe Lee**, Lenny's former coach and West Middle math teacher. Lee expects to see more perfect scores from Lenny as a high schooler. Stay tuned for further developments.

Teacher Ruth Knop Receives Presidential Award for Excellence

West High School's **Ruth Knop** is a recipient of the prestigious Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching.

President Obama named 108 mathematics and science teachers as recipients of the award in July. This year's awardees represent all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, U.S. Territories,

and the Department of Defense Education Activity schools. The educators received their awards at a Washington, D.C., event in the summer.

The Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching is awarded annually to outstanding K-12 science and mathematics teachers across the country. The winners are selected by a panel of distinguished scientists, mathematicians, and educators following an initial selection process done at the state level. Each year the award alternates between teachers teaching kindergarten through sixth grade and those teaching seventh through 12th grades. The awardees named this year teach

seventh through 12th grade.

Winners of this Presidential honor receive a \$10,000 award from the National Science Foundation to be used at their discretion.

They also are invited to Washington, D.C., for an awards ceremony, as well educational and celebratory events, and visits with members of the Administration.

The decision to teach high school students was one of the easiest and most rewarding moments of Knop's life, she says.

"Ever since I taught piano lessons when I was in high school and college, I knew I wanted to be a math teacher because I loved kids and numbers. My goal has always been to do what it takes to make each child successful."

Two Parkway Students Ace ACT College Entrance Exam

Two Parkway students recently learned they scored a 36, the highest possible score, on the ACT college admissions and placement exam.

Typically, less than one-tenth of one percent of students who take the ACT earn a perfect score of 36. The exam is offered at no cost to Parkway juniors. The perfect scorers are **Derek Berndt**, a South High senior, and **Crystal Luo**, a West High senior.

Berndt plans to pursue chemical or nuclear engineering in college. "I want to thank my teachers, especially Mrs. Scott and Mr. Kozeny, for always challenging me to improve as a thinker and as a person," he says.

Luo says she will likely study science in college.

New Progress Reports for Elementary Students

Elementary school parents have noticed a significant change in report cards this November. Single letter grades have been replaced with meaningful feedback from the teacher on each child. The change comes after years of studying grading practices. Parkway teachers and staff found that standard grade cards did not effectively communicate how each child is doing in school. The new elementary progress report is designed to communicate more clearly, more personally and in a way that truly tells the story of each child's learning.

Progress is communicated for character, English language arts, math, science, social studies, physical education, art and music. Notice some of the comments from the teacher on this student's progress in math below.

Comments from teacher:

In our second unit this trimester, students learned how to add and subtract within 100 using an efficient strategy of their choice. Learners also solved for unknown numbers in equations and word problems. Alise scored 88 percent on the post assessment. I notice that when Alise writes a subtraction equation, she often writes the greatest number underneath the smaller number in order to avoid regrouping. This incorrect equation results in an inaccurate answer. I also notice that when Alise writes the time on an analog clock, she often points the hour hand directly at the number without noting the minute hand's position. We will continue to work on these skills in the future.



Parkway Earns Top Marks on State Report Card

The grades are in, and Parkway Schools again earned a high score on the state report card! Parkway is also ranked as one of the top performing school districts in St. Louis County.

Parkway earned 98.6 percent on the 2015 Annual Performance Report (APR) released recently by the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE). Parkway ranked among the top 10 districts in the state with over 1,000 students.

Missouri’s rating system is based on a number of factors including academic achievement, subgroup achievement, high school readiness (K-8), college or career readiness (K-12), attendance rate and graduation rate.



Parkway Receives AAA Financial Rating

Standard and Poor’s Rating Services recently reviewed Parkway’s finances and reaffirmed its AAA rating, the highest available for school districts. Parkway is one of only four Missouri school districts to receive the AAA rating.

The ratings reflect the following:

- Participation in the broad and diverse St. Louis regional economy;
- Very strong income and extremely strong market value;
- Strong financial position, supported with strong reserves; and
- Low debt levels.

Parents as Teachers Celebrates 30 Years

The Parents as Teachers program in Parkway is celebrating 30 years! Currently, 2,027 families that include 3,015 children receive home visits, developmental screening and participate in family activity sessions.

Parents as Teachers is designed to support parents in the important role of their child's first teacher. Study results indicate that children of families that participate in Parents as Teachers are better prepared for school success as they enter kindergarten.

With funding from the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education and The Danforth Foundation, Parents as Teachers began in 1981 in Missouri as a pilot project for first-time parents of newborns. Recognizing the program's benefits and cost effectiveness, the Missouri legislature provided state funding in 1985 to implement Parents as Teachers programs in



all Missouri school districts. Since 1985, Parents as Teachers has expanded to all 50 states and six other countries.





Fifty Students Named National Merit Semifinalists or Commended

Fifty Parkway students have either been named National Merit Semifinalists or Commended in the 2015 National Merit program. The Parkway semifinalists scored at least 214 out of a possible 240 on the PSAT test to earn their distinction.
